Dear friends in Christ,

As we continue in the season of Lent we are remembering the ways that God continues to surprise us anew each day. We continue with our "Surprise Me, God" theme, looking at surprising Scriptures on Sundays and Surprising Women of Scripture at our midweek services.

Unfortunately, the world around us continues to surprise us in some of the most devastating ways. We have been witness to many senseless acts of violence in February and I know many of us are struggling with questions and looking for a way forward to bring an end to this brokenness. As I was thinking on this I felt drawn back to our Affirmation of Baptism service that we use at Confirmation and when welcoming new members. There are a series of promises that are made in that service that we ask people to continue in: "to live among God's faithful people, to hear the word of God and share in the Lord's supper, to proclaim the good news of God in Christ through word and deed, to serve all people following the example of Jesus, and to strive for justice and peace in all the earth."

It is that last promise that stands out to me. That when we affirm our baptism we are making promises to God to work to bring the kingdom of God present here in the world. And the last promise we make is to strive for justice and peace in all the earth. We are called at the time we remember the promises that God made to us in baptism that we have promises we make in return to God whenever we affirm our baptism. Our response to these questions is "I do and I ask God to help and guide me." It is our recognition that we will continue in these promises with the knowledge that we do not do it alone, but we do it with the help of God.

Let us break the silence, brothers and sisters, and live into this promise of striving for justice and peace. Find the ways you can to use your voice – whether it is writing letters to your representatives, calling their offices, finding a way to peacefully protest, engaging in conversation with those who have different opinions and seeking a middle ground that lets us move forward. There are many ways we can choose to use our voices that don't just let us become sounding boards for ourselves but actually begin to make a difference.

I give thanks to God for the plethora of voices that are present at St. Luke's and I look forward to being in conversation with you on how we can be at work in the world!

HOLY WEEK AT ST LUKES

Palm Sunday/Sunday of the Passion – *March 25, 2018 – 8:30 & 11:15 am*

For our traditional services, we will gather in the gym to begin our Palm Sunday procession with palms. We recall Jesus' entry into Jerusalem where his passion will be offered for our salvation. Our focus shifts to the Passion of our Lord. We will be using the service titled The Cry of the Whole Congregation by Walter Wangerin, Jr. The congregation participates in the story as we mark these crucial days in history.

For our GiG praise service we will gather in the Sanctuary and journey from the triumphant entry of Christ to Jerusalem through to his powerful Passion for us on the cross by using Scripture and music to engage us in the story. Our children will be our palm bearers as they join us after Sunday school.

Maundy Thursday- *March 29, 2018 – 7:00 pm*

On this evening we “remember the night in which he was betrayed.” As Jesus shared a Passover meal with his disciples, he washed their feet and gave them a new commandment, that they “love one another as I have love you.” And from the table of the Passover, he lifted the bread and the wine and gave them the gift of Holy Communion. At this service we will experience “The Living Last Supper” in which we will bear witness to that time in the upper room that Jesus shared with his disciples in a living tableau. We will join at the altar to receive the body and blood of Christ and we will end with the stripping of the altar as we hear of the arrest of Jesus in the garden.

Good Friday – *March 30, 2018 – 8:00 pm*

Using a service of Tenebrae, known as the service of darkness, we will hear of Jesus' Passion and meditate on each action that took him to the cross. Candles will be extinguished as we progress through this service leads us into the darkness of Christ's death and burial. We depart in silence awaiting our time to gather again at the tomb on the first day of the week to hear the story continue.

Easter Sunrise – *April 1, 2018 – 6:30 am*

Gathering in pre-dawn darkness, we recall the journey to the tomb of the faithful women who followed Jesus and came on that first day of the week to complete his burial. Their discovery of the empty tomb gave them both hope and fear – until they were greeted by the risen Christ. As darkness turns to daybreak, we celebrate the darkness of sin and death giving way to the light of Jesus' victory over the grave.

Traditional Festive Holy Communion – *April 1, 2018 – 8:30 & 11:15 am*

We will continue our celebration of our Lord's Resurrection around the “Feast of Victory” at Holy communion. Different lessons, hymns, anthems and sermon will give us opportunity to come to more than one Easter celebration today! Invite your friends and neighbors who might not have a place to celebrate this resurrection victory over the grave! “Christ is risen! He is risen indeed!”

GiG Praise Easter Celebration – *April 1, 2018 – 10:00 am*

We celebrate our Lord's victory over the grave with current praise songs giving glory to our risen and victorious Lord! We will hear the Word telling us of Jesus overcoming death and opening the way to life eternal and respond with our voices lifted in songs of celebration. Our children will participate in an Easter egg hunt and party during Sunday school and then join us in worship.

LENT MID WEEK OFFERINGS

This year our midweek offerings will be divided between three causes. Worship life wanted to choose three different agencies that would have impact on local, semi-local, and global needs. The first is Toledo Streets Newspapers. They are a local 501c3 who focus on economic empowerment through micro-enterprise. They are a street newspaper sold on public property by men and women in poverty situations, like homelessness. They provide them with a product to sell, job training, skills development, enrichment and educational opportunities, and networking for further growth. You can read more about them at toledostreets.org. The second is Samaritas (formerly Lutheran Social Services of Michigan). This is a semi-local agency in Southeast Michigan that has social service programs in a variety of areas. Our council has adopted them as their outreach project for this year and will be encouraging the congregation to support Samaritas as well in different ways in the near future. You can learn more about them at samaritas.org. The third is Lutheran Disaster Response (LDR) which provides relief globally. We know that natural disasters that have occurred in the last year are still in the process of being cleaned up and we would like to continue to support these efforts through an agency that sends 100% of funds donated to the affected areas because LDR remains in areas helping long after most other agencies have moved on to the next disaster. WELCA RECIPE OF THE MONTH

SPAGHETTI WITH GARLIC AND OIL

1 lb dry spaghetti

6 T olive oil (extra virgin)

3 cloves garlic, chopped

4 T fresh parsley

Salt and pepper to taste

Parmesan cheese to serve (opt)

1 raw egg (opt)

Prepare dry spaghetti in large pan of salted, boiling water. In a large frying pan, heat the oil and gently sauté all the garlic until lightly golden. Do not let it brown or the taste will be bitter.

Stir in parsley, salt and pepper. Remove from heat until pasta is ready. Drain pasta when it is barely done, place the pasta into pan with oil and garlic and cook together for 2-3 minutes.

Whisk the egg in a dish, remove pasta from heat, place pasta and oil in serving bowl and pour egg over pasta (heat from pasta cooks the egg), blending well by lifting pasta with fork.

Serve with grated parmesan cheese and your favorite wine.

HEALTH MINISTRY NEWS

This month's "News" is an edited version, taken from the *Wellness Letter*, published by The University of California . The entire publication is devoted to eyes – conditions and how to care for them. I will post the entire publication on the Health Ministry board for your review. This article is about the most common eye disorders explained.

Cataracts-a cloudiness of the eye's normally clear crystalline lens. Cataracts can occur at any age (in fact babies can be born with them) but they are most common later in life. About 70% of people over the age of 75 have cataracts. The three common types are defined by where they occur in the lens: Nuclear, cortical, or posterior subcapsular (in the rear of the lens capsule). Nuclear cataracts are the most common; the incidence of this type increase with age and cigarette smoking. Cortical cataracts are also quite common with aging, because they are related to lifetime exposure to ultraviolet rays from the sun. Posterior subcapsular are most likely to occur in younger people. This type is often a side effect of prolonged use of corticosteroids (such as prednisone), inflammation, trauma or diabetes. **Prevention** includes no smoking and use of eye protection. Research reports that high levels of physical activity were associated with a lower risk of cataracts later in life. **Signs and symptoms:** As cataracts progress vision may become blurry, trouble seeing at night or in low light, more sensitivity to light, bright colors may look faded. **Treatment** involves removing all or part of the lens and replacing it with an intraocular lens implant.

Glaucoma is the second most common treatable cause of blindness in the U.S.. Glaucoma is a condition in which deterioration of the optic nerve leads to progressive loss of field of vision. There are two main forms: Ninety percent of glaucoma cases are open-angle glaucoma which produces no symptoms until its late stages. Closed-angle glaucoma occurs more often in persons of Asian or Inuit descent. **Prevention:** eye drops that lower intraocular pressure (IOP) have been shown to delay development open-angle glaucoma with elevated IOP and no other signs of glaucoma. For closed-angle glaucoma laser iridotomy (a hole is made in the iris) may be preventative but this decision is complex. **Symptoms:** in open-angle glaucoma the peripheral nerve fibers are often the first to be damaged resulting in loss of peripheral vision. Closed-angle glaucoma sometimes occurs as acute attacks that strike when the IOP rises rapidly. Sign of an attack include severe pain in the eye, nausea and vomiting, blurred vision and rainbow halos around lights. Chronic closed angle can cause damage without noticeable symptoms. **Treatment:** Most glaucoma cannot be cured but open-angle can be treated effectively with use of lifelong medication or surgery. Acute angle-closure is a medical emergency without treatment permanent damage or blindness can occur.

Age-related macular degeneration (AMD) is a condition that affects the central, most critical part of the retina for sharp vision. There are two types: The dry more common caused by aging and thinning of the macula; the wet form which is more damaging, occurs when abnormal blood vessels start growing underneath the retina and leak fluid or blood that can blur or distort central vision. **Prevention:** There are 2 nutritional supplements AREDS and AREDS2 patented by Bausch & Lomb. Other products do not contain the same formula –ask your doctor. For unknown reasons the incidence has been dramatically declining so that the risk is nearly 90% lower for baby boomers than their grandparents at the same ages. **Symptoms:** Initially there are none but as the disease progresses blurry vision with distance or reading, hazy vision or faded colors, or difficulty going from bright to dim light. AMD can be detected with dilated eye exam. **Treatment:** The AREDS formulas can slow the progression. For wet macular degeneration, laser treatments can prevent the disease progression. Newer treatments involve drugs injected directly into the affected eye.

The Transition team will commit to meet regularly, twice a month, to initially review and renew elements of the identity of St. Luke's. This will include : Historical overview, Mission and Vision evaluation, Asset mapping with identification of strengths and weakness, Gifts for ministry that are present and those desired for future outreach, a reality check on the cultural shifts occurring and their impact on ministry.

A formulation of a staffing model that addresses the outcomes of the above hard work and if that outcome is to call another pastor then the completion of a Ministry Site Profile.

Accommodation of any and all surprises that may occur along the way!!!!


